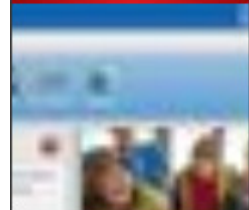
Sunnyside Acres groin injury results in five stitches

Police and bylaw officials are looking for the owners of a collie-like dog after a jogger was bit in the groin while running in Sunnyside Acres last week.

The man, an elementary school teacher who lives in South Surrey, said he was running his usual route through the forest when he came upon an older couple walking their dog. As the jogger approached from behind, the dog suddenly turned and lunged, he said.

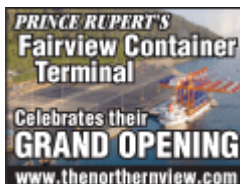

"When I came close, the dog turned around, jumped at me – right between the legs," the father of two said. "I had no time to react. "I was on the ground, screaming and moaning in pain."

The jogger, who asked not to be named, said the route is one he runs every other day. Tuesday, he was about 300 metres along a trail that stretches in from 148 Street when the attack happened. He noted the dog was on a leash, but said the male owner commented to him that the dog "sometimes does that," referring to the canine's reaction.

"He said, 'I didn't see you coming... if we had known you were coming, we would've held the dog better.' So they knew he was vicious, or could be vicious," the man said.

While the man stopped briefly to see if he could help, the woman immediately left with the dog, he said. Another couple on the trail came to the man's aid, loaning him their cell phone to call for help, and staying with him until it arrived.

In hospital, the teacher received five stitches, was given antibiotics, and was told by a urologist that he was "lucky."

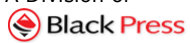
"It was just the skin that was cut, and he didn't touch anything I will need," the man said.

He said a police report was made, and he did return to the area with an animal-control officer in an attempt to find the dog and its owners. He said he didn't get a clear look at the couple, however, "I would recognize the dog."
